Dr. Godbole remains an active member of NAMI-Illinois and the Mental Health Association of Illinois. He recently served on AHA's Behavioral Health Task Force.

A distinguished fellow of the American Psychiatric Society, Dr. Godbole's career spans more than 30 years. He has authored several articles, presented at various national meetings, and was the founding president of a 100-physician multispecialty Independent Physicians Association affiliated with Ravenswood Hospital. Mr. Hirsch has over 20 years administrative experience in the healthcare industry managing both acute care and psychiatric/substance abuse hospitals. He is currently the Administrator for Kalispell Regional Medical Center (KRMC) which is a general acute care hospital and CEO of Pathways Treatment Center, a 40 bed psychiatric and substance abuse hospital, both a part of Northwest Healthcare Corporation, Montana..
