



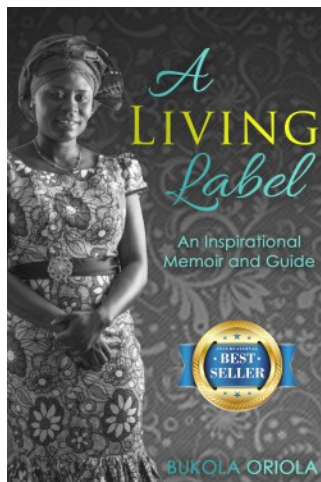
The Reality of Labor Trafficking Webinar

Labor trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery in which individuals perform labor or services through the use of force, fraud, or coercion. Health care providers and leaders can play an important role in recognizing and responding to human trafficking victims. Greater awareness of human trafficking among providers and other health care professionals enables the health care system to more effectively assess risk among vulnerable patients in the U.S. and can improve victim identification and response. This webinar will provide hospitals and health systems the tools to identify and respond to potential victims of labor trafficking.

Bukola Oriola is a speaker, author, mentor, advocate, entrepreneur, and member, U.S. Advisory Council on Human Trafficking. Appointed by President Barack Obama in December 2015, Oriola is also an award winning journalist and a survivor of labor trafficking. She has dedicated her life to helping others by sharing her story, and offering practical solutions to service providers, clinics, community members, and law enforcement on how to help victims of human trafficking. Oriola is a consultant for the Office for Victims of Crime Training and Technical Assistance Center (OVCTTAC).



Dr. Susie Baldwin, MD, MPH, is the Co-Founder and Board President of HEAL Trafficking and Medical Director of Office of Women's Health, Los Angeles County Department of Public Health. Dr. Baldwin is a preventive medicine physician who works as the Medical Director for the Office of Women's Health at the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health. Since 2005, Dr. Baldwin has supported survivors of human trafficking (HT) through clinical care, research, training, and advocacy. She co-founded HEAL Trafficking, an organization that works to expand knowledge about the intersections between HT, health care, and public health, and advances systems change to improve outcomes for survivors.

Dr. Baldwin became immersed in anti-trafficking work when she provided specialized health care for HT survivors at a community clinic in Los Angeles from 2005 – 2012. She was a member of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Technical Working Group to develop the national SOAR training curriculum, and she led the development of the [HEAL Trafficking Protocol Toolkit](#) for Developing a Response to Victims of Human Trafficking in Health Care Settings. She was invited to give a TED MED talk on the topic in 2016.
