Dear Acting Administrator Slavitt:

As the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) continues its Medicare payment reform efforts, we write to urge the agency to use its existing authority, where appropriate, to more broadly waive regulatory barriers that limit care coordination and collaboration. Such regulations were designed for the Medicare fee-for-service (FFS) environment; their waiver is necessary to allow payment reform to more effectively move into the post-FFS era, thereby producing more insightful lessons for policymakers and innovators developing the next generation care delivery system.

CMS's payment reform models fall into one of two categories: 1) those that maintain the underlying incentives of FFS Medicare, where taxpayers bear all of the financial risk, such as Track 1 accountable care organizations (ACOs); and 2) those that change FFS incentives by requiring providers to share financial risk with taxpayers, such as the Comprehensive Care for Joint Replacement (CJR) Model. It is this second category of payment reform models, sometimes referred to as "down-side risk" models, that are the proper target for waiver of regulatory barriers. The continued application of FFS regulatory barriers within downside risk payment reform models often hinders providers' ability to identify and place beneficiaries in the most clinically appropriate setting. It also inhibits their ability to test new, more patient-centered and streamlined clinical pathways. To facilitate these advances, we encourage CMS to grant providers – both hospitals and post-acute care providers – in all downside risk payment reform models greater flexibility in designing and testing new clinical and payment approaches. We urge CMS, to the greatest extent of its authority, to waive the regulations (such as the Long-Term Care Hospital 25 percent rule) that CMS or Congress established for use in FFS reimbursement that stymy the redesign of episodes of care that involve both hospital and post-acute care services and other cross-setting innovations.

We believe that testing new approaches in an environment free from artificial barriers to care coordination will more effectively advance patient-centered solutions that improve clinical outcomes and reduce overall costs and variation.

In addition, we encourage CMS to consider new payment approaches for Inpatient Rehabilitation Facilities and Long Term Care Hospitals. These higher-cost settings face challenges within downside risk payment reform models because currently, any new efficiencies achieved are not reflected in their per-discharge Medicare reimbursement. Hospitals and other stakeholders, in order to effectively partner with these settings within downside risk payment reform models, need more flexibility.
