Legislative Update

<u>Senate HELP Committee Approves Mental Health Reform Act:</u> Among other provisions, the bill would establish a chief medical officer at the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to promote the use of evidence-based practices and require the agency to report on progress toward strategic priorities. It also would require the Health and Human Services secretary to issue guidance to health plans on mental health parity protections, and training and resources for care providers and patients on sharing protected health information. The committee also approved four bills aimed at preventing opioid abuse and overdoses. The legislation could be considered on the Senate floor next month, along with additional amendments. Sen. Susan Collins (R-ME) said she plans to work with the Senate Finance Committee and sponsors of the bill to offer an amendment to address the Medicaid exclusion for "institutions for mental disease," which excludes coverage for inpatient psychiatric services furnished to adult beneficiaries under age 65. Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse (D-RI) also plans to pursue amendments to increase access to child psychiatrists through the National Health Service Corps.

<u>Senate Approves Bipartisan Bill on Opioid Epidemic:</u> Early this month, the Senate voted 94-1 to approve the <u>Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (S. 524</u>), bipartisan legislation to address the nation's opioid epidemic. The bill would establish an interagency task force to develop best practices for pain management and medication prescribing, and authorize grants to states, local governments, nonprofit organizations and others to prevent and treat abuse of opioids, heroin and other substances.

<u>\$94 Million Awarded to Treat Opioid Use Disorders:</u> The day after Democrats failed to add \$600 million in emergency funding to S. 524, a bipartisan measure to address opioid abuse, the Health Resources and Services Administration awarded \$94 million in grants to <u>271 health centers</u> to screen and treat an estimated 124,000 new patients for substance abuse, with a focus on opioid use disorders in underserved populations. Among other uses, the awards will allow the centers to hire more providers, increase access to medication-assisted treatment and train health professionals to make informed prescribing decisions, <u>said</u> HHS.
