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# Situation Analysis

The number of Americans age 65 and older is rapidly increasing, and Medicare comprises nearly 50% of Atrium Health Cabarrus' payer mix. To address needs specific to this patient population, hospital leadership is taking innovative and critical steps to improve acute care for older adult patients.



### **Project Goals**



Tailor care for older adult patients using the Age-Friendly Health Systems 4Ms Framework — what matters, medications, mentation and mobility.

Become an Acute Care for Elderly (ACE) without walls organization.



#### **Actions Taken**

- Conducted an ACE SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats) analysis at the hospital.
- Established an ACE task force that includes representation from medical leadership, nursing leadership, pharmacy, case management, senior behavioral care, and administration.
- Developed care pilots that uniquely addressed each of the 4Ms — what matters, medications, mentation and mobility:
  - Volunteer patient ambassador program (what matters)
  - Geriatric inpatient pharmacist (medications)
  - Exercise physiologist program (mobility)
  - Transitions of care program (mentation)

### **Positive Outcomes**

- Volunteer patient ambassadors conducted "what matters" conversations with 61% of older adult patients so far.
  - 66% of older adult patients who participated in these conversations and completed the patient experience survey said that they would likely recommend the hospital, exceeding the unit's target goal.
- Inpatient pharmacy pilot reviewed medications for 255 patients age 65 and older upon admission and throughout their hospital stay. These patients experienced a lower average length of stay than those who did not receive such a review.
- Mobility compliance increased from 20% in April 2022 to 62% in October 2022, after exercise physiologists started working with patients.
- Average fall rate decreased from 6.89 (January April 2022) to 2.37 (May – July 2022), exceeding stretch goal.
- Overall, average readmissions decreased from 1.14 (January April 2022) to 0.812 (May – July 2022).
- Received positive feedback from older adult patients, patient visitors, unit care teams, ancillary departments and volunteers.
- Received approval for funding a future geriatric inpatient pharmacist.
- Received support to pursue an age-friendly medical unit at the hospital.
