- Engage the workforce





CORE PRINCIPLE

Involve patients and community in their own care

Engage patients, families and community stakeholders to design care that is responsive to their needs and preferences.

KEY ACTIONS:

- Gather feedback from pregnant and postpartum women.
- Create avenues for patients and others to share care preferences.
- Establish forums for moms to connect.
- Develop processes to screen for and address social needs.
- Engage and partner with community-based groups.
- Engage dads and other caregivers.






DC PQC's Commitment to Change

District of Columbia

- 8 Wards
- 6 Birthing Hospitals
- 1 Birthing Center
- Wards 7 and 8 experience the highest rates of pregnancy-related morbidities and mortalities



2.1%

of women that delivered a baby in a DC hospital experienced severe maternal morbidity during their stay (2022) 90%

of maternal deaths in the District were identified as Non-Hispanic Black (2019-2023)

70%

of maternal deaths were women from Wards 7 & 8 (2019-2023) 1%

of women that delivered a baby in a DC hospital had pre-eclampsia and/or eclampsia (2022)

Establishing the Patient and Family Action Network

PFAN's Role in DC PQC

 Created to ensure patient voices are central in addressing maternal mortality and morbidity in DC.

Early Engagement

- Participants were made comfortable sharing experiences, even in the presence of clinicians who may have cared for them during childbirth.
- Ensured understanding of medical terminology and meeting agendas to facilitate meaningful contributions.
- Collected feedback and addressed questions raised during meetings to improve future engagement.

- Involved patients in planning and feedback during monthly Technical Assistance meetings.
- Patient partners provided insights on making the materials more accessible and patient-friendly.

Obstetric Hemorrhage Bundle

- Patient involvement in planning and execution of Community of Learning sessions.
- Patient participated in designing simulations that address trauma and provider-patient communication with a patient feedback component.
- Patient partners shared real experiences and contributed to discussion on best practices in hemorrhage management.

Postpartum and Perinatal Mental Health Workgroups

• Patient partners participated in workgroups, helping refine policies and procedures related to perinatal mental health and postpartum care.

About Temple Health & Our Community

- With the Lewis Katz School of Medicine at Temple
 University, Temple Health is an academic medical
 center serving one of the most diverse,
 underserved populations in the nation
- Based in North Philadelphia, our patient population faces complex social determinants of health
- Building on a longstanding commitment to meet the health and social needs of the community, Temple opened the Temple Women & Families Hospital on September 3

40%
of our patients live below poverty level

86% are covered by government insurance

Maternal Health in Philadelphia

- Philadelphia faces one of the highest maternal mortality rates in the nation
- Since 1997, **14 of 19 maternity units in Greater Philadelphia have closed**, leaving families with few options
- Temple Women & Families Hospital opened as the region's only dedicated hospital for women and families

Temple Women & Families Hospital aims to reverse these trends through community-centered healthcare driven by access, quality and experience

Planning with Community Insight

- To best meet the health and social needs of the community, Temple Health worked closely to understand our patient populations' real needs
- Community feedback was collected over a two-year period, through:
 - Patient surveys
 - Focus groups
 - Listening sessions

- Health and resource fairs
- Partnerships with community organizations

These insights helped inform everything—from the hospital design to specialized programming

Mama Model – Pilot Program

Work with community reiterated how important community-informed support was for our patients:

- Perinatal trained Community Health Workers (pCHWs) support individuals carrying high-risk pregnancies
 - 1/3 of our patients enter pregnancy with hypertension, diabetes or obesity
 - High-risk patients have an appointment burden up to 3 visits a week
- pCHWs provide trauma-informed, peer-based support, education, and resource navigation
- The program supports continuity of care for three months postpartum to improve maternal and infant outcomes



One-Stop Shop for Women & Family Health

Patients have access to comprehensive women's health services and direct pathways to Temple's full range of specialties

- Maternity Care
- Gynecology & Urogynecology
- Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU)
- Breast Health
- Menopause Management
- Behavioral Health


- Expanded Medical/Surgical Services
 - Family Medicine
 - Pediatrics
 - Bariatric Surgery
 - Endocrinology
 - Rheumatology
- Comprehensive Radiology Services
- Direct Referral Unit (DRU) a referral unit for OB and GYN patients requiring time-sensitive care for minor concerns.

LENA Mobile App

Lena is a mobile app designed to guide and support patients through every stage of pregnancy. With Lena, patients can:

- Follow a personalized pregnancy plan with week-by-week guidance linked directly to Temple Health medical records.
- Get reminders that keep you on schedule tracking appointments, lab milestones, and key check-ins.
- Learn from Temple Health experts through articles and videos in English and Spanish, created by Temple doctors
- Earn rewards along the way for mother-baby essentials.
