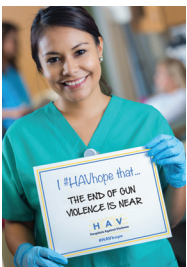
HAV recognizes that community violence is a public health issue and has prioritized resources on human gun violence prevention and mass violence incidents.
