
Chart 7.10: Percent of Spending for Individuals with Chronic Conditions by Insurance Status, (1) 2013

There were two distinct differences between this analysis and the study's methodologies. First, this analysis used the Chronic Conditions as defined by the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality Medical Expenditure Panel Survey (MEPS) documentation. Second, it solely relied on MEPS 2013 data and did not use the two additional data sources that were referenced in the Anderson 2010 study (i.e., three opinion telephone surveys commissioned by the Partnership for Solutions and designed by Johns Hopkins and the 1996 Survey of Income and Program Participation data for characteristics of family caregivers).
